

Central Aid, A Trailblazer in the Non-Profit Space

Central Aid was inaugurated in December 1988 by Rev. Dr. Mensa Otabil as an agency of the church to offer financial assistance to brilliant but needy Ghanaians for their secondary, technical and vocation education.

The establishment of the Foundation was very timely, for it set the tone for the church to have a structured approach to its social support initiatives.

In addition to the financial assistance programme, the mandate of Central Aid was expanded in 1996 to include social and community development projects, relief services, and career guidance and counselling for the youth. For several decades since its establishment, many lives have been touched and beneficiaries continue to testify about the life changing experiences they have had with the organization.



ICGC Donated to Covid-19 Trust Fund





The International Central Gospel Church (ICGC) responded to the Covid -19 pandemic in several ways.

The church has made a contribution of one hundred thousand Ghana Cedis (GHc100,000.00) to the Covid-19 National Trust Fund.

The presentation ceremony was done by three members of the Presbytery, Rev. Morris Appiah, Prophet Christopher Yaw Annor and Rev. Anthony Cudjoe. The three leaders presented the cheque to the Chief of Staff at the Office of the President, Madam Akosua Frema Osei Opare, at a brief ceremony at the Jubilee House on 2nd of April 2020.

Speaking on behalf of the church, Rev. Morris Appiah, said the General Overseer of ICGC, the Presbytery and the entire membership of the Church are concerned about the outbreak of Covid-19. He said it was important for the church to support Government's efforts at stopping the further spread of the disease.

In her response, the Chief of Staff Madam Akosua Frema Osei Opare, registered the sincere appreciation of the President and people of Ghana, to the leadership and members of the ICGC for their kind gesture. She urged the people of Ghana to stay strong and to adhere to the movement restrictions imposed by the President as well as observing all protocols such as washing of hands and maintaining social distancing.

Prophet Christopher Yaw Annor, after the ceremony shared a word of prayer with the Chief of Staff and her entire office. He beseeched God to rain His manifold wisdom on the President, his cabinet and all those in authority to enable them take timely and strategic decisions that will help curb the spread of the disease.

It's effect on the church as well as nations can also be described as indescribable. Coupled with that, there is a financial strain on all individuals, institutions and countries. The church really lived up to its expectation of showing love when it mattered most. After all, what is Christianity without love?

Rev. Dr. Michael Perry Tettey is a Reverend Minister of ICGC and currently the Deputy General Secretary of the church. He is also the Senior Pastor of ICGC Resurrection Temple.

Rev Tettey had a shaky experience when as a teenager he had to leave home.

He recounts his experience, "I was living with my uncle who was a chief and he wanted to involve me in the performance of some rituals. I refused and had to leave."

"In 1993, things became very difficult for me and my education began to suffer. I badly needed a miracle. Just about that time, I got introduced to the Central Aid and applied for it. I was so excited when I was granted the scholarship."

Receiving the financial assistance to enable him pursue his technical education was the turning point in his life. It opened up opportunities which shaped his vision and sharpened his leadership potential. Today he looks at his experience and uses it as a launch pad for advocating for Central Aid.

He said, "I am a big advocate of Central Aid. The intervention I received really turned my life around. I encourage all ICGC members to support Central Aid".

the beginning.

Remember the Bible says: "Assuredly I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me" (Matt 25:40). I am also excited about the Central Aid team, the board and the secretariat and how we all share in the founder's vision and exude so much energy to accomplish it.

What kind of support do you expect from the members of ICGC?

A huge support is needed from members of the church. One of the hallmarks of our founder is 'the can-do spirit'. He believes that we can do things on our own without relying on foreign intervention. He believes he can raise people who would be able to

support the work of God locally. On this note, I appeal to ICGC members to support Central Aid financially. Members should let the pride of belonging to the ICGC fraternity, reflect in their giving for the purposes of putting smiles on the faces of the underserved and the underprivileged in society.

Name one project that you are extremely proud of?

The educational scholarship programme, which has so far supported over 6000 beneficiaries, is something I am extremely proud of. I was brought up on an island in the Afram Plains in Ghana with only one house on the island - our house. At the time, it was a house with no neighbours so there was no next door neighbour. But through education, I left the island and I have grown to manage different organizations. Education really opens doors and the beneficiaries of the Central Aid educational scholarships are blessed to be part of this scheme.

How do you see the future of Central Aid?

I see a very bright future ahead of us. Central Aid will be a global force Christian charity organization that will continue to stand out among its peers. This is why it is important for all of us especially members of ICGC to support the organization. An investment in Central Aid is great investement for our fututre leaders. It is a worthy contribution to humanity. Central Aid is and will continue to be a credible, transparent and accountable faith based organization.


